NASHVILLE ROTARY SERVICE TRUST

NRST Annual Footprint Fund – Rotarians once again supported the community efforts of our Rotary Club with their support of the NRST Footprint Fund. 87% of members participated we total commitments of \$212,500.

NRST Investment Committee - Mark Lincoln, Chair

--**5 Rotarians** met twice to monitor investment policies and guidelines with Regions Bank to manage the investment fund of over \$1,600,000 for maximum return.

NRST Community Investment Committee – Joanne Pulles, Chair

--A new committee structure was put in place with a Rotarian serving as Coordinator for each of the three focus areas. Laura Creekmore – hunger/nutrition; Rich Rhoda – literacy/education; and Phil Ryan – housing/community enhancement.

--The committee received and evaluated 39 grant applications with a goal of selecting one signature grant of up to \$100,000 and three to five smaller grants to optimize our local impact and embrace the diversity of our community through larger and more strategic community investments with a goal of investing up to \$250k annually.

--The committee recommended and the Board approved \$200,000 in grants to support five organizations in our three focus areas: Nutrition/Hunger, Literacy/Education, and Housing/Community Building; \$13,500 for support of three international projects; and \$2,500 be held in reserve to allow responsiveness to additional opportunities.

COMMUNITY SERVICE - Evette White, Liaison

2015-16 Community Service Initiatives – Joanne Pulles, Chair

This Rotary year, the Club continued to focus community service efforts in the areas of hunger/nutrition, education/literacy, and housing/community building.

HUNGER / NUTRITION GRANTS **\$12.500 - NUTRITION FOR KIDS - SECOND HARVEST FOOD BANK**

Funds provide nutritious, easy-to-eat meals for students identified as being nutritionally deprived during weekends and holidays when food resources may not be available. 20-25 Rotarians meet monthly during the academic year to back the food bags which are delivered to an elementary school.



\$42,500 - FEED THE NEED - SECOND HARVEST FOOD BANK



Funds provide enough food for meals for one week to 1,500 families/individuals in the Watkins park community. More than 300 Rotary volunteers participated in this service initiative. Now in our 15th year, this is our Club's Signature project.

Once again Rotarian Steve Richards, Richards & Richards donated the boxes for our delivery. During the first day event, we

sorted 19,376 pounds of donated food, packed 3,296 tray meals, made 1,843 sandwiches for Kid's Café program, and bagged 2,833 - 5lb. bags of potatoes; all of which is used in the emergency food box program for distribution to needy families.

\$20,000 NASHVILLE FOOD PROJECT

Funds provide for emergency response meal delivery to several communities in Nashville. Rotarians volunteered at the Center to prepare the garden for planting and prepping vegetables for meals.



LITERACY /EDUCATION GRANTS

\$10,000 - IMAGINATION LIBRARY - GOVERNOR'S BOOKS FROM **BIRTH FOUNDATION**

This grant provided funding to provide free books to children from birth to age 5. Additionally, program registration information was included in the 1,200 holiday food boxes distributed to families in the Watkins Park community.

\$10,000 -READING IS FUNDAMENTAL- BOOK'EM

58 Rotarians volunteered as classroom readers spending a minimum of 5, 1-hour sessions reading to classrooms. At the end of each reading session, every child in the classroom receives a book.



\$20,000 – PUPPET TRUCK - NASHVILLE PUBLIC LIBRARY FOUNDATION

This grant provides funds for the preschool literacy initiative that emphasizes the importance of developing literacy skills by educating teachers, preschoolers, and parents utilizing the Puppet Truck program. The sponsorship for the Puppet Truck will be displayed on the outside of the truck that goes to schools and civic centers throughout the community.

\$5,000 - STUDENT LED CONFERENCE VISITS - LEAD PUBLIC SCHOOL

Funds provides students at LEAD Public Schools, an opportunity to meet informally with Rotarians to discuss academic achievements and options for continuing their education. In 2016, for the 2nd year, LEAD Public Schools celebrated 100% college placement among the graduating class.



\$10,000 - FAMILY LITERACY CENTER - YWCA

Located at Grace M. Eaton Center, the Center includes childhood education, adult literacy, parenting education, and interactive parent-child learning time. More than 45% of female-headed households live in poverty in Davidson County, low family income and a mother's lack of education are the greatest risk factors to a child's early learning and development.

\$1,000 - ROTARY YOUTH LEADERSHIP ACADEMY ROTARY DISTRICT 6760

The Club endorsed applications of two students from LEAD Public School for Rotary's leadership training program for young people between 14-18 years of age. The students participate in a 5-day program of outdoor activities, leadership training events, seminars, etc.



HOUSING/COMMUNITY BUILDING GRANT

\$7,500 - HABITAT HOUSE - HABITAT FOR HUMANITY



In co-sponsorships with other groups, the funds helped to purchase construction materials to build a one-story, three bedroom home for a qualifying family in The Woods subdivision in Northern Davidson County. 25 Rotarians participated in the build day designated

for Rotary members. Additionally, the Club contributed \$400 for the purchase of a washer and dryer as a house-warming gift for the family.

INTERNATIONAL PROJECT GRANTS \$3,500 - THE HOPE OF HEARING - UNITED METHODIST MEN



Funds help to fund audio logical diagnostics, hearing aids, batteries, ear molds and educational assistance to children in Haiti, Rotarian Gil Hanke, a speech-language pathologist, has made 24 visits to the island nation since 1989.

\$3,500 -MALI MEDICAL SUPPLY SHIPMENT - PROJECT C.U.R.E

Provided shipping of 2-40ft containers of medical equipment to hospitals in Mali, in partnership with other Rotary Clubs and churches. Rotarian Raymond White, since 2008, has made 19 trips to 11 countries and sent 48 shipments of supplies worth about \$18 million.



\$3,500 - H.E.A.R.T - HAITI EDUCATION AND RESOURCE TEAM



This was a collaboration with the Rotary Club of Mid-Town Atlanta; a club that has an established, on-going project in L'Ecole Mixtec des Sibert (Co-Ed School of the Eagles), Croix des Bouquest, Haiti. The grant provided funding for desks, chairs, and tables in student classrooms and for trees. Rotarian Phil Corwin has been

involved in this initiative since inception and last fall traveled to Haiti to assist in the furniture installation.

\$7,500 - PERU WATER PROJECT - LIVING WATERS OF THE WORLD

This project included installing a clean water system in the Asociacion Iglesia Presbiteriana Evangelica de Moyobamba, our partner church in Moyobamba, Peru, in November. In addition to the congregation of about 400, clean water is being supplied for daily use to the 275 students at Annie Sopper School.
